This Week

All Saints' Day, Sunday November 3

This Sunday, November 3, we celebrate All Saints' Day. We will read the necrology, the names of those who have passed into eternal life in the last year, at both services.

Children's Activity in the Church Library, Sunday, November 3 at 10am

We will not have Godly Play or our First Sunday approach to worship at 10am on All Saints' Day, but we will still have **a special craft activity for children during the 10am service.** Children who want to participate can meet the Godly Play teachers in the church library at 10am. They will join you in the parish hall for Communion.

Music Notes for Sunday, November 3

Our offertory anthem for November 3, "My Eyes for Beauty Pine," by Herbert Howells (1892-1983), was first published in 1925 and is a setting of a poem by Robert Bridges (1844-1930). This anthem was chosen for the Feast of All Saints because it expresses the desire for the presence of God, a yearning for communion with the saints, and a vision of Light as a symbol of holiness. Howells was an English composer best known for his choral and organ works. His music is traditional and lyrical but is marked by a sometimes surprising harmonic modernity and a shifting sense of time and meter. Howells belonged to that generation of English composer deeply affected by the horrors of the First World War. His music was also influenced by the death of his son, Michael, in 1935, which led him to compose his *Requiem* and the *Hymnus* Paradisi, arguably his greatest works. "My Eyes for Beauty Pine" is a small jewel of an anthem, exemplifying Howells' flexible melodic style in both the vocal and accompaniment lines. Our closing hymn will be the first four verses of Ralph Vaughan Williams' festival hymn Sine Nomine ("For all the saints"). Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) was older than Herbert Howells, but of the same artistic generation, and Howells viewed him as a mentor and teacher. After the closing hymn, the congregation will follow the crucifer, clergy, and choir to the columbarium during the postlude.

"Make Me an Instrument of Peace: A Guide to Civil Discourse," November 3 and 10

On November 3 and November 10 at 11:30am, Rev. Pamela will offer additional classes in a series designed to be helpful during the election season and the generally contentious times in which we find ourselves. **We'll meet in the church library.** This is a drop-in class; come when you can, as you are, ready to listen deeply and be heard with respect.

November 5: Election Day Prayer Opportunities

St. Martin's labyrinth, meditation garden, and prayer chalkboard will be open. Room 8 will be open for prayer from 9am – 12pm and 2pm – 5pm. The Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations will offer virtual prayers from 5 - 7pm PT. Episcopalians from around the church will hold silence and lead participants in prayers for peace, the nation, and all people and countries. November 6: Morning Prayer, Centering Prayer, Evening Prayer, and Labyrinth Walk If you would like to pray with others in your local community on November 6, the day after Election Day, we have two opportunities. **At 8:30am**, we will hold our weekly Morning Prayer service, led by Rev. Pamela. This is a brief service based on the Daily Office, as found in the Book of Common Prayer. We will include a litany for our nation. That evening at **5:00pm**, we have Centering Prayer in Room 6/7. **At 5:30pm**, we will offer Evening Prayer outside (a brief service) and will also make the labyrinth available for a candlelight walk. Whether the results of the election lead you to lament or rejoice, or even if we are still awaiting the results, prayer is always a faithful response to the circumstances.

Update on Worshiping in the Parish Hall and Simple Ways You Can Help
