The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined. (Isaiah 9:2b)

WELCOME: Welcome to this time when we can, with others, acknowledge the "blue" feelings we may have in this season. For many who have lost a loved one, this is a time of sharp loneliness. For others, who have lost a relationship, health, a job, or had a financial setback, or who are simply worried about the many challenges facing the world today, it may be a time of pain, confusion, or fear. This is not a joyous season for everyone—and for many it is a time of conflicting emotions. All of what you bring with you this evening is welcome here.

We extend a special warm welcome to Rev. Dr. Brandon Austin and congregation members from Davis United Methodist Church.

The church is partially dark as the service begins. Please stand, as you are able.

Officiant Light and peace, in Jesus Christ our Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

Officiant If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me, and the light around me turn to night," darkness is not dark to you, O Lord; the night is as bright as the day; darkness and light to you are both alike.

Let us pray. Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

BLESSED ARE YOU WHO BEAR THE LIGHT

Blessed are you who bear the light in unbearable times, who testify to its endurance amid the unendurable,

who bear witness to its persistence when everything seems in shadow and grief. Blessed are you in whom the light lives, in whom the brightness blazes your heart a chapel, an altar where in the deepest night can be seen the fire that shines forth in you in unaccountable faith, in stubborn hope, in love that illumines every broken thing it finds.

CANDLE LIGHTING AND LITANY OF REMEMBRANCE

Sometimes working through our feelings by putting them into words or finding a physical ritual that expresses them can be very comforting. After the candle-lighting portion of the service (on pages 5-6), we have three options; you may choose all of them, one or two of them, or none. One option is to come forward to light a candle and say a silent prayer. Another option is to come to the altar rail for healing prayer and anointing. In addition, we have small lighted trees near the entrance to the church, with prayer tags and pens on a table nearby. You are invited to write a prayer or intention on the tag and tie it to one of the trees. This can also be done after the service. And of course, you are very welcome to stay in your pew and pray and sing!

Officiant We light four candles, one at a time, acknowledging our pain as we bring our wounds into the healing presence of Christ—the One who was, who is, and who is to come.

First Candle

Reader We light this candle to remember those persons who have been loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices.

(We hold a moment of silence for the lighting of the first candle.)

Reader We give thanks for the memory that binds them to us this season and always.

People May God's eternal love surround them.

Second Candle

Reader We light the second candle to redeem the pain of loss: the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the

loss of physical or mental health, and the loss of hopes and dreams.

(We hold a moment of silence for the lighting of the second candle.)

Reader We pause to gather up the pain of the past and offer it to God, asking that from God's hands we will

receive the gift of peace.

People Refresh, restore, renew us O God, and lead us into your future.

Third Candle

Reader We light the third candle to offer ourselves compassion and love this season. We remember the poignancy of memories, the grief, the hurts, and the pain of reflecting on our own mortality.

(We hold a moment of silence for the lighting of the third candle.)

Reader We pause to reflect on our own resilience and to give thanks for those who have helped us on our journey.

People May we remember that the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

Fourth Candle

Reader We light the fourth candle to remember our faith and the gift of hope that the coming of Christ into the world can offer us. Even in our darkest moments, God is with us.

(We hold a moment of silence for the lighting of the fourth candle.)

Reader We remember that the God who shares our lives and our burdens, our joys and our sorrows, promises us a time when there will be no more pain and suffering, and when God will wipe away every tear.

People Let us remember the One who shows the Way, who brings the Truth, and who bears the Light.




